Q.: What jobs did you have before that prepared you for this one?

A.: I worked as a wastewater operator for a large steel company prior to coming to Gage Products.

My first job at Gage was working in the solvents recycling department. I learned how to safely handle hazardous solvent waste and recycle it back to original specifications to meet our customers' quality expectations.

Q.: What are the most important skills you need to be successful at your job?

A.: I need to have knowledge of all the tank receiving, cleaning and filling processes. In addition, I need to know how the quality of my work will affect downstream processes. Knowledge in how to safely handle hazardous materials is essential.

Q.: What are some things people might be surprised to hear about your job?

A.: The processes for receiving, cleaning and filling tote tanks are ideally handled by a two-person team. Occasion-

ally, I have to handle all of these processes by myself, for example, if someone else is on vacation. While this slows the process down a bit, our standardized work instructions allow us to complete the work safely and in a thorough manner.

Q.: What's your favorite part of your job?

A.: Working as a team – good teamwork makes any job easier.

- Earnings in the chemical industry are higher than average, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. Weekly earnings for all production workers in chemical manufacturing averaged \$809 in 2008, compared with \$724 for workers in all manufacturing industries.
